

LEGAL REFERENCE FOR THE ANNUAL REPORT

This Annual Report is designed in part to meet the provisions of Chapter 105, Article 3, Section 5/3-6 and Section 5/3-15.8 of the School Code of Illinois. The report of schools visited and meetings attended as required by Section 5/3-5 is provided quarterly to the Public Service Committee of the Kane County Board. In addition, as established in Chapter 105, Article 2, Section 5/2-3.62 in the School Code of Illinois, the Regional Office of Education shall provide services to support administrators and teachers in the planning, implementation, and evaluation of education for gifted children, computer technology education, mathematics, science, and reading. The Regional Office of Education may provide training, technical assistance, coordination and planning in other program areas such as school improvement, career guidance, alcohol/drug education and prevention, and alternative education.

REPRESENTATIVE ACTIVITIES AND DUTIES OF THE REGIONAL OFFICE STAFF

Distributed \$150 million in state and federal funds through 186 different accounts to the nine (9) local school districts and 30 private/parochial schools.

Processed approximately 1,550 new applications for teaching certificates and registered over 14, 000 certificates.

Visited each of the 150 public school buildings in the Region to monitor life/safety requirements.

Appointed instructors for school bus driver classes, held initial classes for 123 new drivers and refresher classes for 767 drivers.

Assisted the State Board of Education during its recognition visits of Kane County School Districts. Provided school officials and the general public with information regarding area school districts and the School Code of Illinois.

Reviewed and approved, or returned for correction, a multitude of State Board of Education reports and applications filed by local school districts.

Superintendent Mejia served on the following committees: Northern Illinois University Alumni Board; Phi Delta Kappa; Kane County Gang Task Force; Child Advocacy Board; Kane County Workforce Development Board; Illinois Association of Regional School Superintendents; 4th vice President for Illinois Association of County Officials and Area One Technology Hub Board as Chairman.

Assistant Superintendent Vallejo served on the following committees: Board Member for the Communities in Schools; Board Member for Education to Careers; Advisory Board Member of State Safe Schools; Member of Council for Exceptional Children; Member of the Illinois Association of Regional School Superintendents; Member of the Community Crisis Team Committee; Member of Chicagoland Leadership Committee; Chairman of Kane County Safe Schools Committee; Member of Phi Delta Kappa; and State Scholarship Committee.

REGIONAL OFFICE OF EDUCATION BUDGET

Funds for the operation of the Kane County Regional Office of Education are provided by Kane County. This does not include salaries for the Regional Superintendent and the Assistant Superintendent, both of whom are paid by the State of Illinois. Nor does it include wages and operating expenses of The Professional Development Services Division or the Visual Media Co-op, which is funded by membership fees. The following budget and expenditure figures are based on the County's fiscal year, which runs from December 1st through November 30th.

FISCAL AGENT RESPONSIBILITIES

DCFS, LAN #47

The Kane County R O E performed fiscal agent duties for the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services Flex Funds Program through the Local Area Network #47 based in St Charles. This office was responsible for receiving, disbursing via requisition, and reporting all LAN #47 funds.

In the year ending June 30, 1998, this fund provided goods and services totaling \$35,431 for 25 different children. The average per child was 3.6 requests at \$393.68 per request. Goods and services ranged from clothing to respite care to medical expenses.

VALEES

The Kane County R O E performed fiscal agent services with related auditing and financial duties for the Valley Education for Employment System located at the Waubensee Community College in Sugar Grove.

VALEES is a Vocational Education Cooperative that received grants from the Illinois State Board of Education totaling \$1,506,151 in FY98 and serves 18 school districts including 21 Local Education Agencies in parts of Kane, Kendall, LaSalle, Lee and DeKalb Counties.

SCHOOL RECYCLING & WASTE REDUCTION PROGRAM

The Kane County R O E also acted as fiscal agent for The Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs Recycling Grant. This program provided materials & supplies for teacher workshops, student field trips, and classroom education in addition to the purchase of recycling equipment for schools.

Total Recycling Grant revenues for FY98 were \$14,932.30.

KANE COUNTY REGIONAL BOARD OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES

Three new Board members were elected to serve on the Board. This year legislation was introduced to eliminate the Regional Board and to transfer their duties to the Regional Superintendent. There were no detachment petitions filed with the Regional Board of Trustees this year. The members of the Regional Board of School Trustees are Robert Peterson, Kay Clancy, Dave Henderson, Thomas Milnamow, Lyle Oncken, G. Michael Stoffa, and Dorothy Sullivan.

REGIONAL OFFICE OF EDUCATION/AURORA UNIVERSITY MASTERS COHORT PROGRAM

Aurora University and the Regional Office of Education have collaborated to develop and provide a 36 hour Masters degree program for the teachers in Kane County. The teachers may receive their degree through a program of Masters in Teaching or Masters in Educational Leadership. Approximately 400 teachers are actively involved in furthering their education through this program.

KANE COUNTY VISUAL MEDIA CO-OP

The Kane County Visual Media Cooperative was established in 1938 to serve the teachers and staff in our region by providing educational 16mm films, videotapes and laser discs for their classroom use.

The Cooperative is open to all public and non-public educational institutions in Kane County. The nine district superintendents operate as the Board of Directors for the Cooperative. The Regional Office of Education serves as the administrative agent for the Cooperative. Funding: for the Cooperative is obtained by fees paid by member districts and institutions on the usage. For the 1997-98 school term cost of renting a 16mm film, videotape or laser disc was \$2.96 per week. This past year, the cooperative received over 4,500 requests, with an average of 125 requests per week.

This year no new titles were purchased for the cooperative.

The Kane County Visual Media Cooperative now has over 2,000 educational films, videotapes and laser disc titles in its inventory.

KANE COUNTY GROUNDWATER PROJECT

The Kane County Regional Office of Education and the Kane County Health Department cosponsored this unique community-based project which demonstrated how state and local agencies, municipalities, community and business organizations, and schools could successfully work together to understand and address groundwater issues and concerns in Kane County. The project included an awareness/involvement phase, a training of trainers phase, and a teacher training phase. The partnerships developed through this project will support our students and communities in understanding and protecting this important resource for our future. This project was funded through the support of the Kane County Board, the Kane County Regional Office of Education, the Kane County Health Department, business and community contributions, and the schools of Kane County.

HOMESCHOOLING

The Regional Office of Education serves as a resource to those parents who are interested in homeschooling their children. Information is shared with the parents to assist them. A request is made for parents to register with the regional office as a homeschooling parent and assure that education is being provided to their children.

HIGH SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY TESTING PROGRAM (G.E.D.)

The Regional Superintendent is delegated the responsibility of administering the G.E.D. testing program in accordance with the Illinois School Code. This program allows those who are 18 years of age or older and did not graduate from high school or who are 17 years of age and have been out of the school system for one full year to secure a High School Equivalency Certificate if they pass the test.

Two testing centers have been established in Kane County, Central School in Elgin and Waubonsee Community College in Sugar Grove. The tests require two days and are administered on consecutive Saturdays.

A \$15.00 fee is charged to cover the cost of test administration and a \$10.00 fee is charged for the certificate for those who successfully pass the exam.

JUVENILE JUSTICE CENTER

An agreement between the Regional Office of Education, St. Charles School District and the Chief Judge assures that the Regional Office of Education is responsible for the educational program for the students at the Juvenile Justice Center. The teachers provide daily instruction to meet the educational needs of the students.

KANE COUNTY YOUTH OUTREACH PROGRAM

In 1997-98 we completed the 23rd year of a joint Kane-DeKalb County Truancy Prevention Program and continued the 10th year of the Kane County Dropout Intervention Project. Kane County serves as the administrative agent for the Two-County program under the Directorship of Assistant Superintendent Vallejo.

Kane County had **1,478** “official” referrals from our local schools requesting truancy assistance from our staff. The services provided during the 1997-98 school year were the following:

KANE COUNTY REGIONAL SAFE SCHOOLS PROGRAM

The Regional Safe Schools Program (RSSP) began with a planning and implementation grant in school year 96-97. This program is a result of legislation providing programs for disruptive students who are eligible for suspension or expulsion. The legislature appropriated \$15 million for safe schools programs. Regional Offices of Education wrote program grants to access this money. These funds are renewable on an annual basis. These funds are used by Kane County to provide educational programs to disruptive students in a variety of ways. Districts U-46, 129, 131, and 300 operate alternative to suspension programs. These programs keep students in school during the term of their suspensions. Districts U-46, Mid-Valley (Districts 101, 301, 302, 303, 304), and District 300 operate alternative to expulsion programs. All the above programs are under the auspices of the Kane County Regional Office of Education.

In 1997-98 approximately 1400 students were served in the above programs. They were served at 15 different sites. Seventy-four of these students were eligible for expulsion. Instead they attended RSSP sites in their local districts. Eighty percent of these students completed the program successfully. Due to the RSSP expulsions have been reduced by 50% in Kane County since the 1994-1995 school year. Suspensions were reduced due to the alternative to suspension program. Ninety percent of the students in the alternative to suspension program were successful.

KANE COUNTY DROPOUT INTERVENTION PROJECT

The 1997-98 school year marked the 10th year of this project. The goal of the Dropout Intervention Project is to bring “disconnected” youth from 16-21 years of age back into the mainstream of society. As of June 1998, the Project enrolled 53 students in the GED Program.

REGULAR EDUCATION INITIATIVE (REI)

The Regular Education Initiative Program was funded through an Illinois State Board of Education Grant. The REI Program focuses on providing training and support for schools to encourage special and regular education personnel to work together cooperatively to provide a total education program for all students. The REI staff development program has three (awareness, implementation, and replication) levels of training. Workshops and materials are provided at no charge to participants and substitute reimbursement is provided to schools involved in this program.

ACADEMIC STANDARDS

The Kane County Regional Office of Education received a general operations grant from the Illinois State Board of Education to provide development, information and research on best practices, and on-site technical assistance to schools. This year a major focus of the work of the ROE was on the new Illinois Learning Standards. In addition to the state standards grant the general operations grant paid for educators to learn about and align instruction with the standards through the following:

THE INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE PILOT PROGRAM GRANT

The Illinois State Board of Education Quality Assurance process consists of an external visit to audit each school every few years and an internal review which each school must conduct annually. The Kane County Regional Office of Education is charged with supporting and guiding schools through this complex school improvement process so that teaching and learning are improved every year. This grant was provided by ISBE as a support for school improvement terms in pilot schools in this, the second year of a three year transition period. Specifically, the grant provided a three day training, subs for release time for SIP team work during school days, and stipends for teacher teams to work during non-school hours.

ILLINOIS ADMINISTRATORS' ACADEMY

All individuals employed in positions requiring a Type 75 certificate as a condition of employment (Illinois School Code Section 5/24A-3) are required to attend a minimum of one Illinois Administrators' Academy Required Strand program during each two-year phase.
