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Legal Reference for the Annual Report

This Annual Report is designed in part to meet the provisions of Chapter 105, Article 3, Section 5/3-6 and Section 5/3-15.8 of the School Code of Illinois. The report of schools visited and meetings attended as required by Section 5/3-5 is provided quarterly to the Public Service Committee of the Kane County Board. In addition, as established in Chapter 105, Article 2, Section 5/2-3.62 in the School Code of Illinois, the Regional Office of Education shall provide services to support administrators and teachers in the planning, implementation, and evaluation of education for gifted children, computer technology education, mathematics, science, and reading. The Regional Office of Education may provide training, technical assistance, coordination and planning in other program areas such as school improvement, career guidance, alcohol/drug education and prevention, and alternative education.

REPRESENTATIVE ACTIVITIES AND DUTIES OF THE REGIONAL OFFICE STAFF

Distributed \$194 million in state and federal funds through 186 different accounts to the nine (9) local school districts and 30 private/parochial schools.

Processed approximately 1,550 new applications for teaching certificates and registered over 14, 000 certificates.

Visited each of the 150 public school buildings in the Region to monitor life/safety requirements.

Appointed instructors for school bus driver classes, held initial classes for 94 new drivers and refresher classes for 787 drivers.

Assisted the State Board of Education during its recognition visits of Kane County School Districts. Provided school officials and the general public with information regarding area school districts and the School Code of Illinois.

Reviewed and approved, or returned for correction, a multitude of State Board of Education reports and applications filed by local school districts.

REGIONAL OFFICE OF EDUCATION BUDGET**(COUNTY PORTION ONLY)**

Funds for the operation of the Kane County Regional Office of Education are provided by Kane County. This does not include salaries for the Regional Superintendent and the Assistant Superintendent, both of whom are paid by the State of Illinois. Nor does it include wages and operating expenses of the Visual Media Co-op, which is funded by membership fees and the Professional Development Services Division which is funded by the Illinois State Board of Education. INSTITUTE FUND REPORT

KANE COUNTY REGIONAL BOARD OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES

The Regional Board of School Trustees is an elected body with the sole responsibility of action on detachment/annexation petitions regarding boundary changes between school districts in the region. This year the board concurred with a petition which was filed before the Lake County Regional Board of School Trustees to allow Barrington CUSD #220 to detach from the Special Education District No. 825, Lake County. The members of the Regional Board of School Trustees are: Kay Clancy, Dave Henderson, Thomas Milnamow, Barbara Vondrak, Lyle Oncken, G. Michael Stoffa.

Regional Office of Education/Aurora University Masters Cohort Program

Aurora University and the Regional Office of Education have collaborated to develop and provide a 36 hour Masters degree program for the teachers in Kane County. The teachers may receive their degree through a program of Masters in Teaching or Masters in Educational Leadership. Approximately 700 teachers have completed or are actively involved in furthering their education through this program.

Kane County Visual Media Co-op

The Kane County Visual Media Cooperative was established in 1938 to serve the teachers and staff in our region by providing educational 16mm films, videotapes and laser discs for their classroom use.

The Cooperative is open to all public and non-public educational institutions in Kane County. The nine district superintendents operate as the Board of Directors for the Cooperative. The Regional Office of Education serves as the administrative agent for the Cooperative. Funding for the Cooperative is obtained by fees paid by member districts and institutions on the usage. For the 1998-99 school term cost of renting a 16mm film, videotape or laser disc was \$2.96 per week. This past year, the cooperative received over 4,500 requests, with an average of 125 requests per week.

This year no new titles were purchased for the cooperative.

The Kane County Visual Media Cooperative now has over 2,000 educational films, videotapes and laser disc titles in its inventory.

Homeschooling

The Regional Office of Education serves as a resource to those parents who are interested in homeschooling their children. Information is shared with the parents to assist them. A request is made for parents to register with the regional office as a homeschooling parent and assure that education is being provided to their children.

HIGH SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY TESTING PROGRAM (G.E.D.)

The Regional Superintendent is delegated the responsibility of administering the G.E.D. testing program in accordance with the Illinois School Code. This program allows those who are 18 years of age or older and did not graduate from high school or who are 17 years of age and have been out of the school system for one full year to secure a High School Equivalency Certificate if they pass the test.

Two testing centers have been established in Kane County, Central School in Elgin and Waubensee Community College in Sugar Grove. The tests require two days and are administered on consecutive Saturdays.

A \$15.00 fee is charged to cover the cost of test administration and a \$10.00 fee is charged for the certificate for those who successfully pass the exam.

Juvenile Justice Center

An agreement between the Regional Office of Education, St. Charles School District and the Chief Judge assures that the Regional Office of Education is responsible for the educational program for the students at the Juvenile Justice Center. The teachers provide daily instruction to meet the educational needs of the students.

KANE COUNTY YOUTH OUTREACH PROGRAM

In 1998-99 we completed the 14th year of a joint Kane-Dekalb County Truancy Prevention Program and continued the 11th year of the Kane County Dropout Intervention Project. Kane County serves as the administrative agent for the Two-County program under the Directorship of Assistant Superintendent Vallejo. Kane County had **1,580** "official" referrals from our local schools requesting truancy assistance from our staff. The services provided during the 1998-99 school year were the following:

KANE COUNTY REGIONAL SAFE SCHOOLS PROGRAM

The Regional Safe Schools Program (RSSP) began with a planning and implementation grant in school year 96-97. This program is a result of legislation providing programs for disruptive students who are eligible for suspension or expulsion. The legislature appropriated \$15 million for safe schools programs. Regional Offices of Education wrote program grants to access this money. These funds are renewable on an annual basis. These funds are used by Kane County to provide educational programs to disruptive students in a variety of ways. During the 98-99 school year Districts U-46, 129, 131, and 300 operated alternative to suspension programs. These programs kept students in school during the term of their suspensions. Districts U-46, Mid-Valley (Districts 101, 301, 302, 303, 304), and District 300 operated alternative to expulsion programs. All the above programs are under the auspices of the Kane County Regional Office of Education.

In 1998-99 approximately 1155 students were served in the above programs. They were served at 15 different sites. Seventy-six of these students were eligible for expulsion. Instead they attended RSSP sites in their local districts. Eighty percent of these students completed the program successfully. Due to the RSSP expulsions have been reduced by 50% in Kane County since the 1994-1995 school year. Suspensions were reduced due to the alternative to suspension program. Ninety percent of the students in the alternative to suspension program were successful.

KANE COUNTY DROPOUT INTERVENTION PROJECT

The 1998-99 school year marked the 11th year of this project. The goal of the Dropout Intervention Project is to bring "disconnected" youth from 16-21 years of age back into the mainstream of society. As of June 1999, the Project enrolled 63 students in the GED Program. Seven of these students received their GED and 84% of the enrolled students continue in the program.

On-Site Technical Assistance to Schools

Part of the responsibility of the Kane County Regional Office of Education is to provide on-site technical assistance to schools and educators as they work to improve curriculum, instruction, and learning. This assistance includes presentations, facilitation services, problem-solving, consulting, coaching, and training.

School Improvement and quality review assurance

The Illinois State board of Education Quality Assurance process consists of an external visit to each school every few years and an internal review which each school must conduct annually. The review should be designed to ascertain the success of the school's programs in terms of student performance and progress with respect to the Illinois State Goals for Learning Standards and local learning objectives. The Kane County Regional Office of Education's role is to support and guide schools through this ongoing school improvement process so that teaching and learning are improved every year.

Career Awareness and Development

The Regional Office of Education implements the Illinois State Board of Education's Career Awareness and Development Mini-Grants. The mini-grants provide funds to support career awareness and development training activities for middle school staffs (6th - 8th grade educators) which will support and complement school district Education-to-Careers district initiatives. As a result of their career awareness and development experience, middle school staffs (6th - 8th grade educators) will be better prepared to provide a comprehensive program of coordinated career development experiences through planned activities in the context of the fundamental learning areas. Beginning in 1999, 4th and 5th grade teachers are also eligible to participate in the grant sponsored training programs.

Vocational Instruction Practicum

The Vocational Instruction Practicum (VIP) is a state-funded program that exposes vocational educators to current trends and technologies in today's ever-changing world of work. This is accomplished by placing secondary school (6-12) and community college vocational teachers, counselors and administrators in short-term private and public sector positions for continuing education. From these placements, vocational educators develop an understanding of the forces impacting on the workplace and use their experiences to improve the quality of vocational instruction within public schools. The Regional Office of Education is responsible for supervision of the VIP Program from selection of participants to evaluation of program results. The VALEES Education For Employment District provided \$12,500 to supplement the state VIP Grant. The funds were used to expand participation of vocational teachers from the VALEES EFE area.
